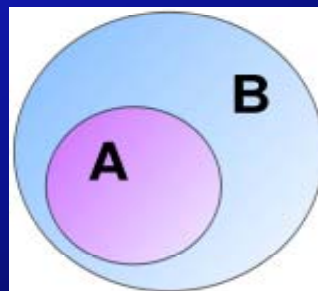

- Curious about the population
 - Population is too big to survey
 - The sample has property P
- L
- Why does it have P ?
 - Because the population has P

D Rival Explanations

- H
- Why does the sample have P ?
- L
- 2 t_1 . Fluke: it's just a coincidence that the sample has P
- 0 t_2 . Bias: the sample has P because of the way the sample was chosen
- 3 t_3 . The sample has P for some other reason, but not because the population has P

D **Statistical Significance**

- H • Making the fluke hypothesis unlikely
- I • Probability theory
- L • Statistical tests
- 2 • Sample size
- 0 • Giere's rule of thumb
 - 100 = $\pm 10\%$
 - 500 = $\pm 5\%$
 - 2000 = $\pm 2\%$
 - 10000 = $\pm 1\%$
- 3 • Important footnote

D Naomi Oreskes' Study

- H • *An Inconvenient Truth*
- I • "Beyond the Ivory Tower: The Scientific Consensus on Climate Change"
- L • *Science* 3 December 2004
- 2 • The "consensus" opinion
- 0 • Institute for Scientific Information (ISI) data base
- 3 • 928 papers surveyed
- Keywords: "climate change"
- 10% of the total
- Some articles thrown out

Critical Thinking

D Naomi Oreskes' Study

- H • Six categories
 - I – explicit endorsement of the consensus position
 - L – evaluation of impacts
 - 2 – mitigation proposals
 - 0 – methods
 - 3 – paleoclimate analysis
 - rejection of the consensus position
- 75% explicit or implicit endorsement of consensus view (1st three categories)
- 25% take no position (next two categories)
- 0% reject consensus position

e₁. In a sample of 928 peer reviewed papers addressing “climate change,” not one rejected the consensus view that “most of the observed warming over the last 50 years is likely to have been due to the increase in greenhouse gas concentrations”

t₀. Most, if not all, scientists working on climate change agree with the consensus view.

t₁. It’s just a statistical fluke that the articles from the sample showed such unanimity .

t₂. It’s just a statistical fluke that the articles listed in the ICI data base showed such unanimity .

t₃. The ICI data base is biased and only lists “green” articles.

t₄. Oreskey, because of her biases, misinterpreted many of the articles as favorable, or neutral, when in fact the authors were arguing against the consensus view.
